



- Counselors will cover graduation requirements, post-secondary planning, career information and more
- Meetings will be tailored to each individual student's goals
- Parents are welcome to attend, but not required

Promotion Requirements

- Credits earned by passing each course
- Grade Scale
 - o A = 90-100
 - OB = 80-89
 - O C = 70-79
 - F = 69 and below (no credit given)

- Promotion by grade level:
 - o 6.0 credits Sophomore
 - o 13.0 credits Junior
 - 2 ELA
 - 1 Math
 - 1 Science
 - 1 SS
 - o 18.0 credits Senior

Graduation Requirements

- Minimum 24 Credits including:
 - 4 Language Arts
 - o 4 Math
 - o 4 Science
 - 4 Social Studies
 - 3 Pathway Courses
 - o 1 Health & P.E.
 - Option: JROTC I-III
 - o 4 General Electives
- Optional: 2 Foreign Language REQUIRED for 4-year colleges in GA



Credit Recovery

Foothills Charter High School

- \$500/credit, \$250/0.5 credit
- Counselors or Grad Specialist can assist
- Pay attention to course completion deadlines for graduation!
- Students may qualify to be Foothills Program Students
- Also, we will look to have after school and summer school opportunities at WBHS for no cost to qualifying students.



What's after WBHS?


- Main topics covered during Senior Meetings and Junior Meetings
 - o 4 Year College/University: Bachelor's Degree
 - o 2 Year/Junior College: Associate Degree
 - Technical College: Associate Degree, Diploma Programs,
 Certificate Programs
 - O Military: Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marines, Navy
 - o Workforce: Full-time job, Apprenticeships, Specialized training
- Students can use YouScience.com results to research further
 - Access YouScience through Student Portal

What do Colleges Consider?

- High factors: GPA and Grades, Rigor and Classes
 - o SAT/ACT Scores
 - Normally a direct factor, during the pandemic schools have discussed eliminating scores from their decisions - check your school's info
- Other factors:
 - O Essays and personal statements
 - Recommendations
 - Activities and accomplishments
 - Student demonstrated interest
 - o Class rank
 - o Interviews

Building a College List

- Consider the following:
 - Campus size/student population
 - O Location: City, suburban, rural
 - O Cost: Tuition, Financial Aid, Scholarships
 - Programs & Majors Offered
 - On-campus activities: Greek life, sports, intramurals/club sports



College Entrance Exams

- Plan ahead, research the college information, study, and take the exam if it's what is best for you.
- 4-Year Colleges: ACT or SAT
 - Normally, we recommend taking both (EARLY), choose one to take again to raise scores
 - No preference by colleges
 - Select schools to send to when you register for the exam
 - Check school admissions sites as some do not need ACT/SAT with high GPA
- Technical Schools: Accuplacer, ACT, or SAT accepted
- Military: ASVAB

ACT

- Philosophy: rewards strong grasp of material and content knowledge
- Score range: 1-36; No penalty for wrong answers
- Covers English, Math, Science, Reading and Writing (optional)
- Waivers available for students who qualify for F/R Lunch, please see your counselor.

- Philosophy: rewards logic, creative thinking and problemsolving
- Score range: 400-1600; No penalty for wrong answers
- Covers Math & Reading Comprehension
- Vocabulary focus words students are likely to use in college
- Going to a digital exam format in March 2024
- Waivers available for students who qualify for F/R Lunch, please see your counselor.

Accuplacer

- Multiple-choice, untimed, computerized
- Covers Math/Algebra and Reading/Writing
- Register to take at the institution you plan to attend typically after you apply
- Most frequently used at Technical Colleges
- May be used for Dual Enrollment admissions at some institutions

PSAT/NMSQT

- Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test
- Test date:
 - October 18, 2023 (10th, will automatically be registered)-FREE!
 - October 19, 2023 9/11 graders--Sign Up through My School Bucks (should be live in My School Bucks on 9/8/2023)* If you have free or reduced lunch, see your counselor.
- Available to 9th Grade Students and Juniors for \$20 (waivers available)
- Why take the PSAT?
 - O Practice for the SAT combined with Khan Academy
 - O Scholarship money (juniors only)
 - O Identifies AP Potential
- Registration Deadline: Sept. 22, 2022

ASVAB Information

- Career exploration assessment for 11th and 12th graders (does not sign you up for military)
- Requirement for military entry (but not just for military!)
- Identify interests & provide information about verbal, math, science, and technical skills
- October 31, 2023 test date
 - O Sign up via form in advisement/counseling office-will be available early October.
 - O Scores will be released to recruiters 60 days after they become available.

HOPE Academic Rigor Requirements

A student must earn a minimum of 4.0 credits from the academic rigor course categories listed below prior to graduating from high school:

Advanced math, such as advanced algebra and trigonometry, math III, taken at the high school, or an equivalent or higher course taken for degree level credit at an Eligible Postsecondary Institution;

Advanced science, such as chemistry, physics, biology II, taken at the high school, or an equivalent or higher course taken for degree level credit at an Eligible Postsecondary Institution;

Foreign language courses taken at the high school, or taken for degree level credit at an Eligible Postsecondary Institution; or

Advanced Placement or Dual Credit Enrollment courses in Core subjects.

EXAMPLE

- 1.0 Algebra II
- 1.0 AMDM
- 1.0 Human Anatomy
- 1.0 Spanish II

HOPE Academic Rigor List

HOPE & Zell Miller Scholarship

- HOPE Scholarship: 4-year colleges
 - Must have minimum 3.0 HOPE GPA (LA, SS, Math, Science, FL)
 - Meet HOPE rigor requirements
 - Pays approx. 85% tuition @ public institutions (does NOT include room, board, books, etc)
- Zell Miller Scholarship: 4-year colleges
 - Must have min. 3.7 HOPE GPA AND 1200 SAT or 26 ACT in one test sitting
 - Meet HOPE rigor requirements
 - Pays 100% tuition @ public institutions (does NOT include room, board, books, etc)
- Both awarded at private schools, amounts vary

HOPE and Zell Miller Grant

- HOPE Grant: 2-year institutions
 - O No HS GPA minimum, must maintain 2.0 during program
 - Covers about 80-85% of tuition (see GSFC.org)
- Zell Miller Grant: 2-year institutions
 - No HS GPA minimum, must maintain 3.5 during program
 - Covers 100% standard tuition based on institution
- HOPE Career Grant
 - Available to HOPE Grant qualified students enrolled in majors aligned with industries in GA needed more skilled workers

Dual Enrollment

- WBHS Coordinator: Daniel Bennett (CRC)
- Earn college credit while working on HS Diploma
- DE funds cover tuition, fees, and required textbooks
- All 10th-12th students are eligible but must meet institutional standards for admission

Current Process for DE (Spring 2024)

- 1. View Dual Enrollment Presentation HERE
- 2. Fill out DE interest form HERE
- 3. Mr. Bennett will reach out with next steps.

This process will change for 2024-25 school year. Be on the lookout for advertisements for Dual Enrollment information nights!


Dual Enrollment continued

- Carefully consider fit and preparedness for college-level work and expectations!
- Consider the schools you may attend after high school do they prefer
 AP or DE?
- Sims Academy will house Barrow DE Options via Lanier Tech professors
- Other factors to consider:
 - O Transportation
 - O Fit with WBHS/extracurricular/job schedules

 - Free & immediate
